GRP Construction on Schedule

IF YOU want to catch a glimpse of the scope of the flood protection work along the Guadalupe River this summer, just drive by the river at Park Avenue, San Fernando Street, or Santa Clara Street and you'll be amazed at what you can see over the construction fences. Major construction is currently underway at several points along the Guadalupe River Park. At the south end of the park, near Woz Way, an inlet structure and overlook plaza are nearly complete. An outlet structure has been constructed just north of Park Avenue, with retaining walls and concrete terraces (see photo) going in between Santa Clara and San Fernando Streets. Between Santa Clara Street and St. John, work has begun on additional inlet structures, and from Santa Clara north to the railroad tracks, a massive underground double box culvert is being constructed to carry overflow floodwaters to the flood plain north of Coleman Avenue.

The U.S. Corps of Engineers will award the contract for the next phase of construction, from the railroad tracks to Coleman Avenue, shortly. Completion of the flood protection project is still anticipated by December 2004 with park amenities and trails in place by Spring 2005.

Partners in Feeding the Hungry

"What do you do with the fruit from your orchard?" That's a question we hear often from visitors to Guadalupe Gardens who see the four-acre Historic Orchard.

The Historic Orchard was planted in 1994 with a sampling of the varieties of fruit trees that once grew so abundantly in the Santa Clara Valley. The trees are now at a point where they are bearing enough fruit to make harvesting worthwhile.

The Board of Directors of the Friends of Guadalupe River Park & Gardens decided several years ago to offer the fruit, when it became available, to Second Harvest Food Bank of Santa Clara County for distribution to the needy in our community. For the past year we have been fortunate to partner with Village Harvest, a nonprofit organization that organizes volunteers to harvest fruit from private orchards and backyard fruit trees for distribution to Second Harvest and other service agencies. The elderly & children in our communities who receive the fruit are so very appreciative, as fruit is not only delicious but nutritious too.

The volunteers of Village Harvest perform a valuable community service. Since January 2003 alone they have harvested over 45,000 pounds of usable fruit for distribution throughout the county. They are planning to have crews work in our Historic Orchard later this summer.
